FBI agents and Sarasota sheriff's deputies continued the search and interviewed a witness to the telephone call who said the abductor may have had a knife-orpistol pressed to the girl's abdomen as she talked with her father.

The long-awaited second call came about 10 a.m. Friday. "Charlotte talked to the detectives, said she was all right, and was asked if she could get away," said sheriff's spokesman Ray Pilon. "She was told to leave the residence any way she could - out a window. She did it, went next door, and called again."

Within minutes, sheriff's deputies rushed to her and arrested Bannister.

The girl's ordeal'started with a restless Tuesday night at the Oscar Scherer State Park about 13 miles from the home she escaped from Friday.

She and eight other girls were spending the night in tents as part of a summer scouting program:

"Char was nervous and jumpy all that" night," said Virginia Wallace, 15, one of three girls in the tent. "She kept saying, 'something's out there."".

At dawn, and several "scares" later, a tall man in dark clothing burst into the tent. Charlotte sat up and yelled, "Virginia, it's back!".

The man then grabbed her. Charlotte's sister, Eleandr, 14, shouted, "Oh, my God,

Screaming and clutching her pillow, Charlotte was dragged from the tent by her long brown hair and disappeared into the sharp-pointed palmetto scrub.

the patrol to the south area.

Taylor said that "it certainly looks like he (the rapist) has been given enough notoriety, and has certainly curtailed his activities, probably due to the tremendous amount of pressure put on him by both citizens and law enforcement activities."

Taylor-said his unit-has made-"hundreds of personal contacts with potential suspects. We did what investigation that is necessary, and are now taking a more pronounced look at some possible suspects."

Taylor emphasized that "there has not been any activity since May 28 by the east

area rapist. All the rumors of other attacks, stories of mutilations and abuse, are untrue.

'We've had other rapes, but it's not

Reese echoed Taylor's comments, saying "as far as we know, he has not been active since May 28. There have been no activities reported to us, and rumors to the contrary are untrue. The sheriff's department is hushing absolutely nothing

Reese declined to elaborate on other aspects of the sheriff's department's investigation, or speculate why the east area rapist has apparently curtailed his activities.
